The retreat strengthened our bond as an international service team and renewed our commitment to be “artisans of hope in our blessed and broken world.” It is in this spirit that we welcome 2022.....*



We have weekly team meetings; and our first meeting of the year “brought us” to Grenoble (France) where we had a virtual meeting with three probanists who were “following in the footsteps of Philippine Duchesne.” We thank them for including us in their itinerary. It was a joy to listen to one another’s hopes and dreams for this new year.

January rolled on with **Rachel** fully engaged in the eco-spirituality center where she lives and works. There, they welcome migrants and provide animation programs for groups, particularly among the poor. **Sheila** kicked off the preparations for the High Level Political Forum with this year’s group from Argentina and Uruguay, Italy, and the Philippines. At the same time, she and the interns of the UN-NGO Office organized a forum on International Day of Education, which gave voice to students and alumni, educators and partners in mission. **Joy** had the grace-filled experience of accompanying the provinces of Peru and Brazil in their retreat journey of walking with Jesus as artisans of hope. The work of coordination continues, and this includes organizing different platforms that connect us as One Body, like the recently concluded student conference of the European Network of Sacred Heart Schools. Thanks to **Rena** who maintains the website of the JPIC Learning Hub, and to **Yolanda** who has successfully completed the migration of the JPIC Database to the Hub, we are able to provide resources in support of our JPIC efforts. All this would not be possible without the help of translators and interpreters, the JPIC Links, and all of you who contribute in different ways to sustain our shared commitment to JPIC.

We resonate with and are inspired by this line from the Special Chapter document:

*“Never has the world and the Society of the Sacred Heart been so interconnected as in the last two years. We were bound together by a global pandemic which helped us see more clearly that we belong to one common humanity.” (p.9)*

Let us claim and strengthen this deep sense of unity as we forge the way forward in 2022!

## TCoP: Learnings from our initial experience

In 2021, we embarked on an initial experience of building Transformative Communities of Practice (TCoP) through the help of the different regions (ASIANZ, Europe-Africa, and Philippine Duchesne). We had both challenging and consoling moments, all of which helped us learn and gain insight into what it means to collaborate among ourselves, and “to be and to act as One Body” (General Chapter 2016). What follows is a brief summary of some of the learnings and feedback that we received.

## Updates from the UN-NGO Office

### The Sacred Heart Campaign for International Day of the Girl 2021

Nine Sacred Heart schools came together in a joint effort to observe International Day of the Girl on October 11. The theme this year was, “*Our Voice, Our Equal Future.*” The Sacred Heart participants shared their passion for speaking out for gender equality, and demonstrated how the Sacred Heart family can act to support social equity, such as reducing female infanticide, alleviating obstacles to girls’ education, addressing “menstruation poverty”, and raising awareness and funds for the prevention of the practice of child brides. ### The Sacred Heart Family Celebrates International Day of Education 2022



On January 24, the UN-NGO Office organized a virtual event to celebrate the gift of Sacred Heart education to global efforts for sustainable development. The event was held twice to accommodate as many time zones as possible. More than 200 people attended, since many of the 175 devices that “zoomed in” represented large communities and classes from around the globe. Participants attended from all regions of the world where the mission of the Society of the Sacred Heart is present and active.

The panel highlighted how Sacred Heart education continues in the tradition of St. Madeleine Sophie who believed in her way that to educate is an act of justice. Speakers and topics included:

- Sacred Heart students Alma and Rubén from St. Madeleine Sophie School in Valencia, Spain who spoke on why gender equality is important,
- Sacred Heart educator Noemi Escobar from Sacred Heart School in Mexico City, presented on education as a human right for all, especially children, as well as the challenges to providing quality education in the midst of current global realities like poverty, forced migration and unequal Covid-19 vaccine distribution
- Alumna Sasha Amelang presented her research on the important role of boys and men as part of solutions to issues of gender inequality in every context, and stressed that gender equality attitudes must be part of school curriculums at all levels
- Alumna Lisabeth Kelly reminded participants that the UN Sustainable Development Goals are a contemporary expression of St. Madeleine Sophie’s vision and that the Sacred Heart Family promotes at least two SDGs wherever we are. They are SDG 4, Quality Education and SDG 5, Gender Equality.

A highlight of the hour-long event was the video presentation on “period (menstruation) poverty” that was created by Kiara, Rajasi, Maria, and Uttara from Sophia Junior College in Mumbai for International Day of the Girl 2021. As one participant put it, we all left delighted to be included and proud again to be a Sacred Heart educator on many levels.

Our group is also part of the larger [JCoR \(Justice Coalition of Religious\)](#) delegation, which consists of representatives from religious congregations of women and men.
