Readings: Is 7:10-14, Ps 24, Rom.1: 1-7, Mt 1: 18-24

Through the Gospel (Mt 1: 18-24) we are invited by God to prepare ourselves to be ready to meet Him.

What does the Word of God require from me personally?

Put your name into this phrase and listen: '**...do not be afraid...**' to do what God calls you to do now, as He comes to be with us.

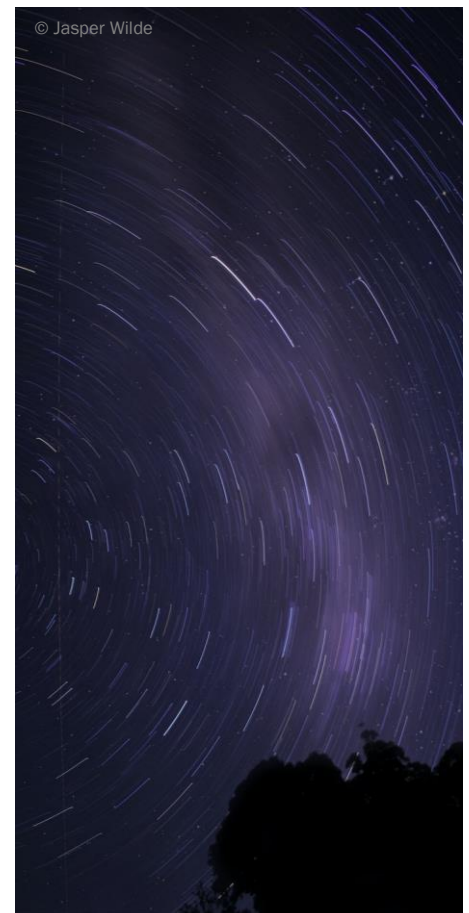
*What kind of answer does He require,

It may be a change of my lifestyle: leaving my comfortable way of life in order to live simply, to be able to share with others or changing my busy life to find time for prayer, reflection, listening to someone who lives close to us.

It may be a change of my attitude towards others: to restore a broken relationship, to be more attentive listening to the voices of the poor, of the afflicted; to open my heart towards those who suffer, towards the poor and the migrants.

It may be getting involved in an initiative to protect the environment or just making a small step like turning off an unnecessary light.

What can I do, what shall I do or what can we do as a group in order to make any change in our world, in our society?

‘We are always capable of going out of ourselves towards the other. Unless we do this, other creatures will not be recognized for their true worth; we are unconcerned about caring for things for the sake of others; we fail to set limits on ourselves in order to avoid the suffering of others or the deterioration of our surroundings. Disinterested concern for others, and the rejection of every form of self-centeredness and self-absorption, are essential if we truly wish to care for our brothers and sisters and for the natural environment. These attitudes also attune us to the moral imperative of assessing the impact of our every action and personal decision on the world around us. *If we can overcome individualism, we will truly be able to develop a different lifestyle and bring about significant changes in society*’. (Laudato Si #208)

(If you are in a group, you can take time for sharing your reflections, ideas)

Finally, as Saint Joseph is the evangelical example for us today, we can ask for his intercession. ‘The Gospel presents Joseph as a just man, hard-working and strong. But he also shows *great tenderness, which is not a mark of the weak but of those who are genuinely strong*, fully aware of reality and ready to love and serve in humility.’ (Laudato Si #242)
