## Welcome, Margaret Mwarili rscj!

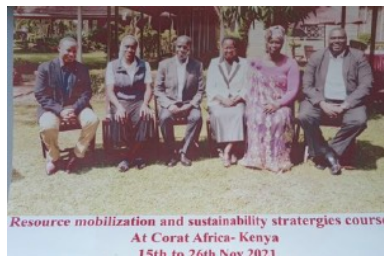


I am Margaret Alusa Mwarili. I was born and raised in a small village in a town called Kakamega in western Kenya. Throughout my primary and high school education, I attended boarding schools run by the Sisters of Mary of Kakamega, a local congregation founded in my home district. After high school, I worked in the Catholic Bookshop in Nairobi with the Daughters of St. Paul. That was where I met some RSCJ; and thereafter I joined the congregation. For higher education, I studied Theology and Education at the Marist International University College (then affiliated with the Pontifical Urbaniana University in Rome). I likewise pursued further studies in School Administration and Supervision at the College of New Rochelle in New York, USA, as well as School Administration at Moi University in Kenya.

Before and after joining the Society of the Sacred Heart, I worked in various ministries including teaching in both public and private primary and secondary schools. I coordinated education programs and administered schools in the heart of the slums of Kibera in Nairobi. Working among the refugees in North Western Kenya with the Jesuits Refugees Service (JRS) and administering a diocesan health facility provided me with the opportunity to accompany and advocate for the needs of the most disadvantaged population: the refugees and persons with HIV. Currently, I am serving as the Development Coordinator of our Uganda-Kenya Province. I coordinate provincial projects, including fundraising for our proposed primary school in Kenya.

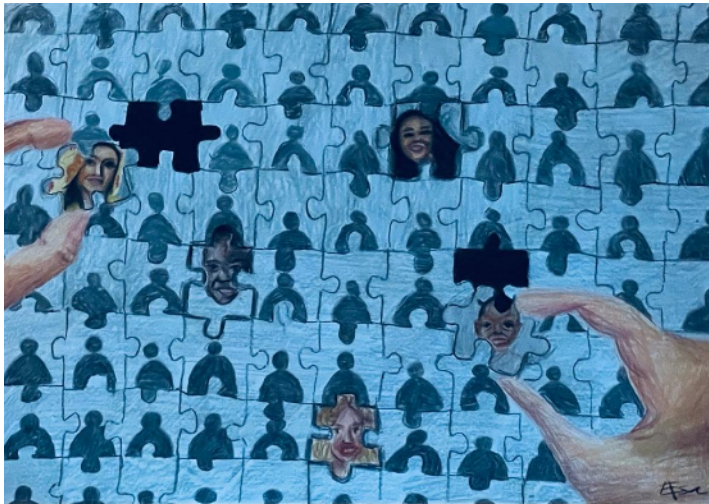
As I take on this new ministry as the representative of the Society at the UN-NGO Office, I feel encouraged as I learn that this work is not a one-person responsibility, but the coming-together of the active involvement of members of the Society and the Family of the Sacred Heart. I hope that, as women seeking to promote Justice, Peace, and Integrity of Creation, we shall stand together to transmit hope in our world. I count on the support and collaboration of each one, and look forward to continue fostering cooperation among us, and furthering networking with other partners in this mission. I pray that the Spirit dwelling within each one of us will empower us to transform our wounded and broken world, and to disseminate hope wherever we are.

We were impressed by the maturity that could be seen in their contributions, but also by their keen awareness of the ecological and human challenges facing our world.

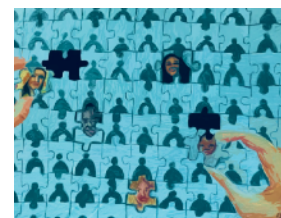
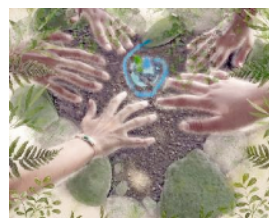
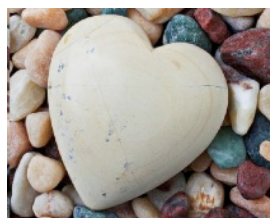
