

The grace to be requested

Vigilance of heart: "let us see your love, lord." (*PS 84:4*) May a new light shine on the meaning of life and in this light may we be ready so that we will not be surprised by his coming. (*cf. Mt 24:44*)

Composition of place

Set the scene with a few photos of creation, of our brother and sister creatures and some seasonal fruit.

"Moving from our settled places" to His very presence in the heart of Life, which is so threatened... The prophecies of Isaiah keep us going throughout this first week and invite us to awaken all our senses and to let the eyes of our imaginations rest on any one of the splendid images of Nature suggested by these promises:

"Let us climb to the mountain...to the house of God... his ways ...by his paths... ploughshare... sickles... no more war....." (Is 2,1-5) / "The seed of the earth... The fruit of the earth... The glory of the Lord will be like the heat of the day, the shade of a dwelling, a refuge, a shelter from the storm and the rain" (Is 4) / "A shoot shall come forth from the stock of Jesse" (Is 11) / "The orchard will be like a forest"... "Come out of the darkness and the gloom..." (Is 29) / "This is the way, follow it... the Lord will give you rain for the seed that you have planted..." (Is 30)

Welcome what happens to me ... what does this contemplation awaken in me? Wonder, gratitude, fear, confusion...How would I describe the relationship I have with the whole of creation at this moment?

After a suitable time of silence, the first sharing...

LAUDATO SI: "An integral ecology includes taking time to recover a serene harmony with creation, reflecting on our lifestyle and our ideals, and contemplating the Creator who lives among us and surrounds us, whose presence "must not be contrived but found, uncovered". #225

"Prayer, as an act of faith and love, as the "breath" of our relationship with God, purifies our hearts, it also enlightens our eyes, "allowing us to grasp reality from another point of view..." (*Pope Francis - May 2021*)

A second time of silence, keeping in mind both the sharing of the others and the following question:

Can I embrace the future that Isaiah envisages for us?

"This contemplative attitude permeates our whole being, helping us to live ever more united to Christ in our relationships, our tasks, and our ministry; it becomes a powerful force of conversion and transformation for mission. In welcoming God's word, Mary gave Christ to the world. In receiving the life of Jesus, we give ourselves with Him so that all may have life."

Liturgy of a man who is totally focused

"Since once again, Lord — ... this time ... in the steppes of Asia — I have neither bread, nor wine, nor altar, I will raise myself beyond these symbols, up to the pure majesty of the real itself; I, your priest, will make the whole earth my altar and on it will offer you all the labors and sufferings of the world...My paten and my chalice are the depths of a soul laid widely open to all the forces which in a moment will rise up from every corner of the earth and converge upon the Spirit...
