


Introduction

The HLPF is a platform to share experiences and initiatives on Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) by participating states—including Voluntary National Review (VNR) countries—the UN system, and other stakeholders. This year, country reports focus on successes, challenges, and lessons learned to strengthen SDG implementation, particularly SDGs 3, 5, 8, 14, and 17. The forum gathered ministerial and high-level government representatives, UN officials, academics, experts, and members of Major Groups and other stakeholders.

Countries participating

Among the 35 countries that presented VNR reports were 6 where the Society of the Sacred Heart is present: India, Germany, Indonesia, Japan, Malta, and the Philippines.

Main Achievements of the HLPF on SDG 3, 5, 8, 14 & 17

35% of SDG's are on track:

- Reduction in maternal and infant mortality
- Increased vaccination coverage
- Girls in STEM are increasing
- Promotion of green technologies, etc.



Over 99% of attending states recommitted to multilateralism!

Major Challenges

- Climate fragility, Biodiversity loss
 - Gender equality is under threat
- COVID-19 pandemic
- Rising Geo-political tension
- Food insecurity
- Digital inequality, etc.





Benefit of HLPF to Religious congregations

- SDG implementation is within reach.
- They gain insight into global challenges and use VNRs data to identify where their services are most needed.
- The HLPF shows how local issues often connect to global systems.
- Various congregations started viewing their ministries through the SDG lens.
