Welcoming Ceremony

Beginning the day by fostering a sense of community and belonging as Pilgrims of Hope. Participants connect through reflection and shared experiences, stepping together into a space of unity, faith, and transformation.

SATURDAY, JULY 26

Mater Admirabilis and Going Back to Our Roots

This day participants are invited to rediscover their spiritual and communal roots with the Society of the Sacred Heart, deepening their connection to faith and heritage. Through prayer, reflection, and cultural sharing, they honor their past while embracing the journey ahead as Pilgrims of Hope.

SUNDAY, JULY 27

Walking with Sophie

The group will deeply connect with Sophie's journey, using her story as a mirror for their own. The day is a reflective pilgrimage that encourages introspection, shared meaning, and the discovery of personal threads that link each person to a broader legacy.

MONDAY, JULY 28

Pope Francis and the Path of Synodality

The group will explore Pope Francis' and the Church's vision on synodality, affirming the transformative role of young Catholics in our community and within the Church.

TUESDAY, JULY 29

The group will attend the Welcoming Mass in St. Peter's Square, opening with a unifying moment of prayer to ready their hearts and minds for the Jubilee.

THURSDAY, JULY 31

Being One with the Church

Beginning the day by inviting participants to reflect on how hope shapes personal journeys and binds generations within the Church community. By considering what hope means for their generation and how it has guided their growth.

FRIDAY, AUGUST 1

Penitential Day

Community Sharing session focused on the themes of penitence, reconciliation, and the Eucharistic dimension of our lives, followed by attending Penitential Day in the city with the Pope.

Vigil with the Pope

Community sending and commitment sharing, followed by attending the entertainment, music, and testimonies events in the city, to close the day by gathering at Tor Vergata for the Vigil with the Pope.

SATURDAY, JULY 26

Opening Prayer: Prayer to Mater Admirabilis

The following prayer, written by Superior General Sabine de Valon in 1960 for use by Convents of the Sacred Heart, was submitted by Mary Lou Gavan, RSCJ.

Mother most Admirable, you make all things easy for us. O Mother of Jesus, we come to you as to a living spring to quench our thirst, or as to a fire to warm our hearts. You are the light of dawn that dispels our darkness, the Mother always attentive to the distress of her children. O Mother most Admirable, life is often hard, nor is it easy to tread the path of duty with unwavering step. It is not easy to love our neighbor, our brother, as Jesus would have us love him, to keep our souls unchanged amid the changing chances of life, to love creatures and yet keep our hearts for God alone, to be little and humble when pride rises up within us. It is difficult to walk steadily toward the God of light, through dark and misty ways. There are days when everything is a burden; but you, O Wonderful

Mother, can make everything easy; not by taking away the hard things, for God did not take away yours. You make them easy by making our love stronger. It was love that impelled you, on the threshold of your high destiny, to utter your “Fiat mihi secundum verbum tuum.” 24 That word, once given, you never took back, you never resisted suffering but opened yourself to its action, humbly and sweetly given to God. O Mother, may your example be my strength. Make everything easy in my life, not by suppressing pain, but by giving me a love stronger than the pain. O most sweet Mother, give me a valiant heart, and when my love grows weak, give me, your child, something of your own love, that I may learn again from you what true love means.

IMPORTANT INFORMATION FOR TODAY

Who is Mater?

In 1828, Pope Leo XII invited the Society of the Sacred Heart to found a community and school at the Trinità dei Monti, a monastery at the top of the Spanish Steps in Rome. For 300 years, the monastery had housed a community of Minims, an order founded by St. Francis of Paola in the 15th century. The Order of Minims had abandoned the property during the French Revolution, and by 1828 the buildings were in need of repair. A contingent of RSCJ went to Rome to put the property in order under an agreement with the French government, which owned the property and specified that only French nuns would occupy the site. Sixteen years after the Religious of the Sacred Heart came to live at the Trinità, a young French woman, Pauline Perdrau, was admitted as a postulant to the Society. A talented artist, she asked permission of the superior of the house, Mother Josephine de Coriolis, to paint a portrait of Our Lady on a wall of a corridor

that led to the 19 sisters' cloister. However, Mother Coriolis was hesitant, because she knew the artist was unfamiliar with fresco painting techniques. Pauline Perdrau persisted, praying to Mary for strength. She prevailed, and for months after receiving permission to begin, she devoted several hours a day to preparing the surface of the wall and painting her image of Mary. When the painting was complete, the colors were thought to be too vivid. The fresco was covered with a protective cloth to give the paint time to dry. Days later, when the cloth was removed, the colors had softened to the shades of pink and blue and ivory that are so well known to visitors to Mater's shrine today. To Pauline Perdrau, who became a Religious of the Sacred Heart, the change was nothing less than a miracle. Among the many stories associated with Pauline Perdrau's painting of Our Lady is this one: In the fall of 1846, Pope Pius IX paid a visit to Trinità dei Monti and was overwhelmed by the beauty of the fresco of Mary. The pope blessed the painting of Mary under the title "Mater Admirabilis," thus

giving it the title it bears to this day. Today, a statue or painting of Mater Admirabilis can be found in every Sacred Heart school around the world. Her feast is marked with liturgical celebrations, alumnae gatherings and pink goûter on October 20.

SUNDAY, JULY 27

Opening Prayer: Sophie's Threads Presentation

Who was St Madeleine Sophie Barat?

In 1779, Madeleine Sophie Barat was born in Joigny, France as fire raged in houses nearby. Truly a child of fire, Sophie's heart was captivated by God from an early age, and she was drawn to a life of contemplative prayer. At the same time she recognized that post-revolutionary France had a pressing need for transformation through rigorous education and a spirituality of the Heart of Christ. Sophie and four companions made their first vows in 1800, giving themselves to a form of religious life which combined the contemplative and the apostolic, the one informing and enlivening the other. "Discovering and revealing the Heart of Christ" remains the mission of the Society of the Sacred Heart to this day.

Opening Prayer

1. Message to Young People at the

Synod (2024): “Keep moving forward courageously. When water flows, it’s good, but when water stops, it ends badly. The young person who is tired is the first to be corrupted. To avoid this, keep moving forward and continue walking with joy.”

Opening Prayer

“If you are part of God’s family, you have been called to a very important mission: to share his love with others. Start sharing the gospel today!”

IMPORTANT INFORMATION FOR TODAY:

Villa Lante

The sixteenth-century Villa Lante in Trastevere is one of the Society’s most historically significant buildings. It has been part of the Society since 1837 when it became the Roman seat of the Society of the Sacred Heart. During this time, it has served the mission of the Society in many ways: as a community home for our sisters, providing various types of education programs, including a school, a kindergarten, an orphanage, and as a center for young people from the local area, Trastevere.

It has also been a center for our General Archives and, of course, the location for probations over the last forty years. The Villa Lante has recently undergone renovations to convert the building into meeting spaces for members of the Sacred Heart family.

WEDNESDAY, JULY 30

Opening Prayer

Prayer of senses:

In silence, we close our eyes and open our senses: Touch. Smell. Hearing. Taste. Sight.

- **Touch, give, receive.** “Put your hand into my side and do not doubt, but believe” (John 20:27)
Don't doubt the life of the resurrected One who is revealed. Touch, feel the feelings, express your tenderness and give thanks.
- **Smell.** “The room was filled with the scent of perfume” (John 12:3)
Smell the different scents of the trees, the plants, the earth...
- **Listen.** “Listen Israel, the Lord is your only God” (Dt 6:4).
To listen, you need to be silent. Listen to the wind, the birds, the insects, everything speaks to you.
- **Taste, speak, praise God.** “It's not enough to say, Lord, Lord, to enter the kingdom of heaven.”

Bring awareness to your mouth perhaps the lingering taste of breakfast, toothpaste, or simply the freshness of this moment. Ask yourself: How is God nourishing me today, even in what I consume or crave?

- **Look behold.** God saw everything he made, and it was very good (Gen 1:31).
Now, slowly open your eyes. Look around, not to judge or understand, but just to see. Let colors, movement, light, shadow, all speak to you. See not just what is there, but who is there. And ask: From where is God looking back at me in all this? How should I look to find Him?

As we prepare to walk into the city today, take these awakened senses with you. Let the streets, the people, the buildings, the noise and the silence become part of your prayer. Remember that God is not only in the sacred places. He is also everywhere else in the world. Walk slowly. Look attentively. Love deeply. And may you find God waiting for you in unexpected corners.

THURSDAY, JULY 31

Opening Prayer

Take a look into your own perspective of hope... recall the words you shared on the first day.

Listen to the RSCJ among us... reflect on tier testimonies.

Take a moment to reflect: What meaning has hope for your generation? What role has hope played in your development?

Let us carry forward this reflection as we discern the ways in which our own hope will shape the future.

FRIDAY, AUGUST 1

Opening Prayer

Reconciliation is a path of growth, one that challenges us to confront what prevents us from living as true people of peace. Today, let us take time to reflect on the attitudes within us that need transformation—those that hinder reconciliation with ourselves, others, and God.

Take a moment to examine your conscience, using the guide provided, and reflect deeply on your journey toward reconciliation. If you feel called, prepare yourself for the sacrament of reconciliation as a step toward renewal.

Opening Prayer

Respond in unison: “Lord, make us your ambassadors of hope.”

5. Jesus, send us back home with feet that walk with purpose, hands that serve with joy, and eyes that look for Your presence in every corner of our world. Let us go—not alone, but together. Not empty, but full of You. “lord, make us your ambassadors of hope”

- How does this reflection shape your journey moving forward?

SUNDAY, AUGUST 3

Closing Prayer

As we gather for this final reflection, take a deep breath and bring to your heart the most significant moments of this pilgrimage—the encounters, the prayers, the moments of grace that have shaped and strengthened you.

Now, in community, let us share:

- **What am I grateful for?**
- **What moment, experience, or phrase showed me the importance of hope in this pilgrimage? How will I carry that learning after this encounter?**

Hope is not just something we receive; it is something we live, carry, and pass on. May this final reflection be an invitation to embrace hope as a guiding light in our lives.
